Background	This communications plan is necessary to ensure, that through engagement, Council will get a robust and well considered Strategy that's had community buy-in and thus a greater level of acceptance from key stakeholders.					
	Since the development of the Biodiversity Conservation Strategy 2004-2014 Byron Shire's diverse ecosystems have experienced increasing pressure from population growth, consumption growth and climate change. Moreover, there have been substantial changes to legislation and the policy framework at the national and state level.					
	At the national level, the release of the Australia's Biodiversity Conservation Strategy 2010-2030 provides a new approach to addressing biodiversity conservation and sets a national direction and targets for biodiversity conservation. In NSW, the recent enactment of the Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016, amendment of the Local Land Services Act 2013 and release of supporting regulations have significantly changed the regulatory landscape, with a strong emphasis on achieving funded biodiversity stewardship on private land. The recent release of the Draft Biodiversity Conservation Investment Strategy 2017-2037 also presents significant changes to how biodiversity conservation will be funded, particularly on private land.					
	Council's new Draft Biodiversity Conservation Strategy will need to align to this current strategic and legislative setting. It will also need to reflect on past achievements, outline actions to meet biodiversity objectives as well as address community concerns regarding the long-term viability of Byron Shire's diverse ecosystems.					
	Successful development and implementation of the 2019 Strategy relies on community engagement, from the initial stages through to implementation. Consultation with the community and key stakeholders will enable the development of a strategy that takes into account issues from a diverse range of stakeholders. It will also provide an opportunity for the community and key stakeholders to gain an understanding of the process of prioritisation for implementation, hurdles to success and funding limitation and opportunities.
