Purpose

Byron Shire Council conducted the 'Byron Youth Survey 2022' in December 2021 and January 2022.

The aim of the survey was to help Council understand the unique needs and views of young people, including their opinions, ideas, experiences, and challenges as young people living, working, studying and/or socialising in the Byron Shire.

The survey helps give Council insight into how we can ensure young voices are heard and considered when making important decisions about Byron Shire's future.

The survey will be used to inform future engagement activities with young people, including how Council consults with young people and on what key topics and issues.

The Survey Findings Report will be shared with local youth services and community organisations to help provide information that may be useful for service delivery and advocacy for young people in the Shire.

Survey design

The survey was developed collaboratively by various teams across Council who all contributed knowledge and ideas. This multi-disciplinary approach ensured the survey design was comprehensive and well-informed and acknowledged that youth are important across the organisation's many work areas. The teams involved included Sustainability, Resource Recovery, Infrastructure Planning, Corporate Services, Place Planning and Community and Cultural Development.

The survey contained a total of 31 questions (refer to appendix) and included:

- Multiple choice questions – with the option to select 'other' and write freely
- Open response questions

The questions focused on the Byron Shire and covered five key areas:

- Demographics
- Young people and the Shire
- What young people care about
- How to engage with young people
- Future vision

All questions were used to gather the opinions, ideas, experiences and challenges of young people within the Byron Shire community.

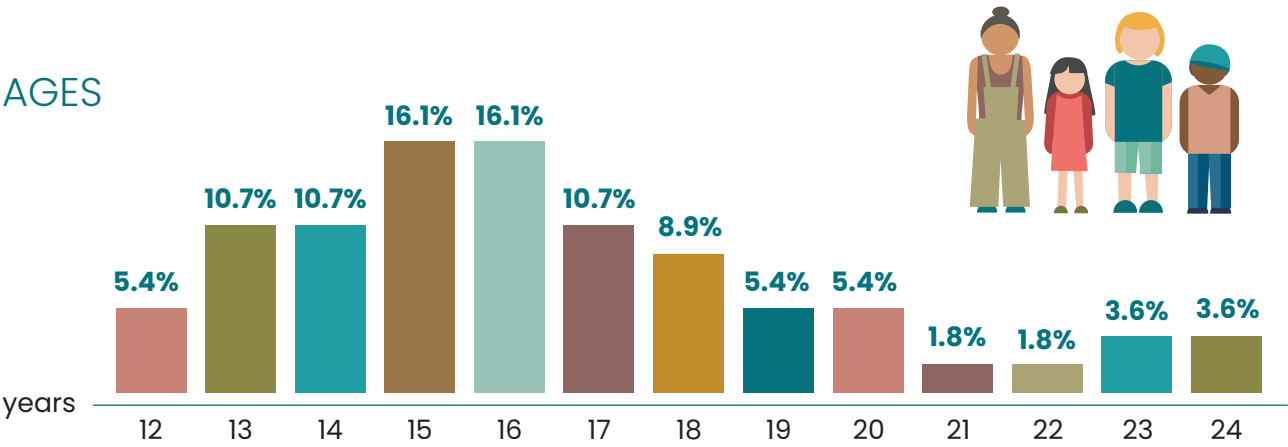
Survey findings

56 young people, aged between 12 and 24 years, responded to the survey.

The number of respondents may have been impacted by the Christmas and New Year period.

Demographics

AGES



73.2% of respondents were aged 13 to 19 years. Importantly, there was at least 1 person representing every age from 12 to 24 years.

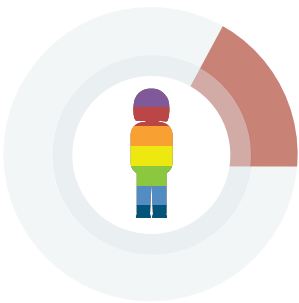

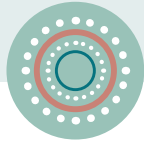


- 60.7% of participants identified as female

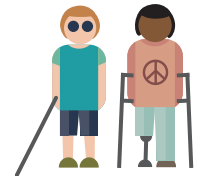

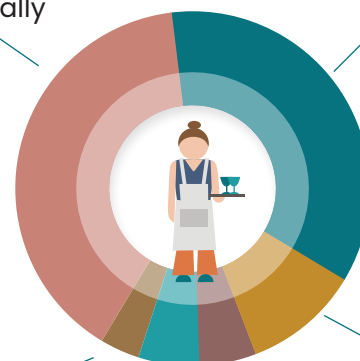

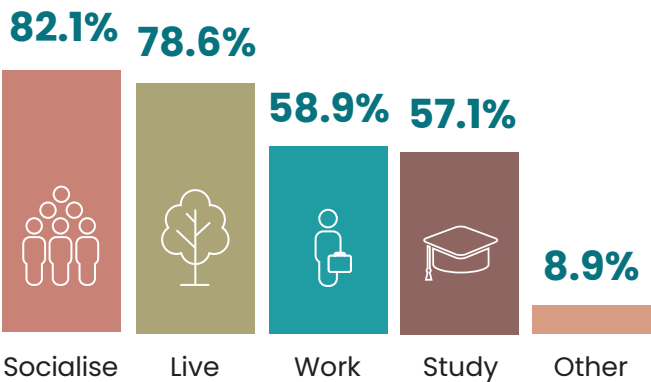

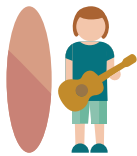

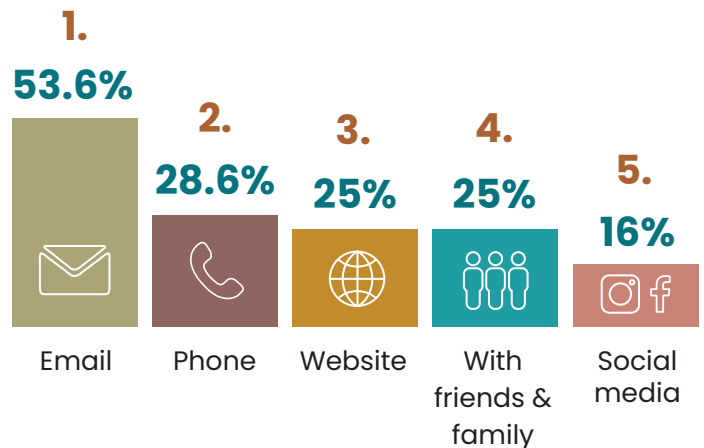

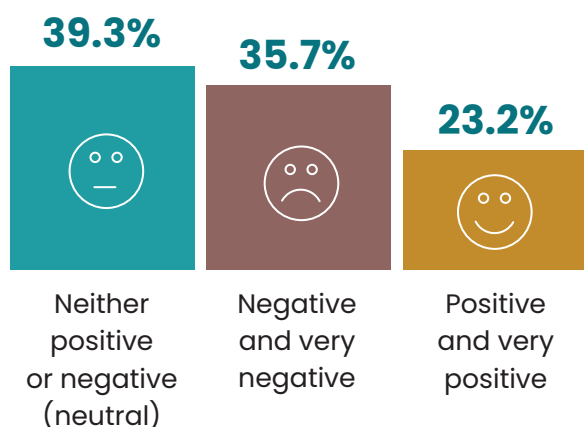

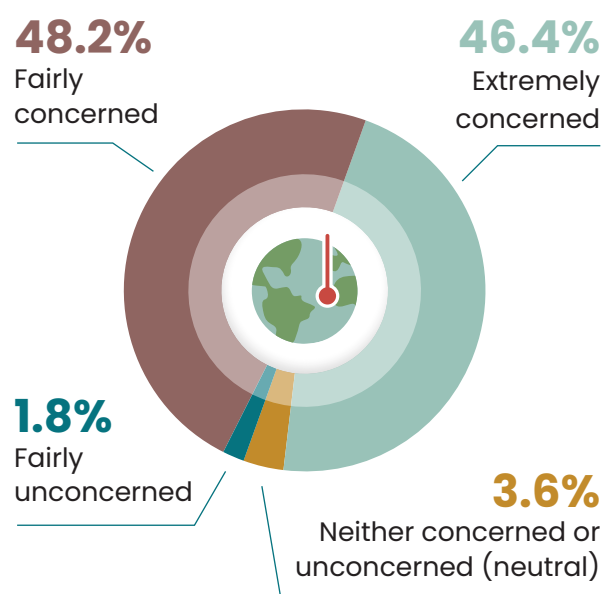

CONCERN ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE



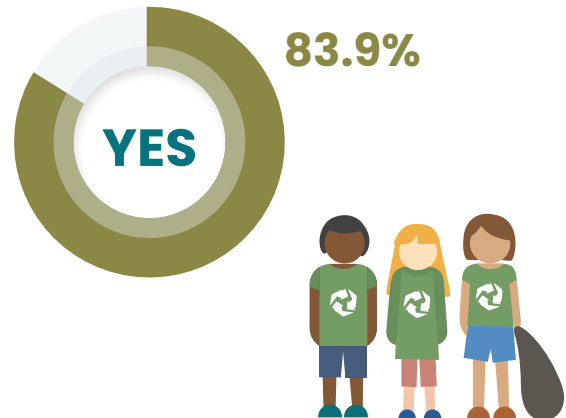
This means that 94.6% of young people indicated some level of concern about climate change (either extremely concerned or fairly concerned).

EXAMPLES OF ACTIONS TAKEN BY YOUNG PEOPLE TO PROTECT THE ENVIRONMENT

"Making sure everything I buy is recycled, not wasting water or food, respecting nature and not throwing rubbish, only supporting local cafes"

"I participate in every climate strike and am always conscious of my wastage"

"Solar power, recycling, picking up rubbish off community grounds, hybrid cars"

"Activism (attend protests), written to the PM, living off grid"

"Recycling, no plastic, plant-based food"

"Participating in student activism and recycling when possible at home"

"Compost, recycling and monitoring water/electricity/carbon consumption"

"I take reusable items like cutlery, straws, cups, shopping bags when I go out as well as being mindful of my waste usage"

"I pick up rubbish on the beach when I go for walks. Also I avoid plastic packaging when I shop as much as possible and I'm starting to look at entrepreneurial sustainable businesses to buy from"

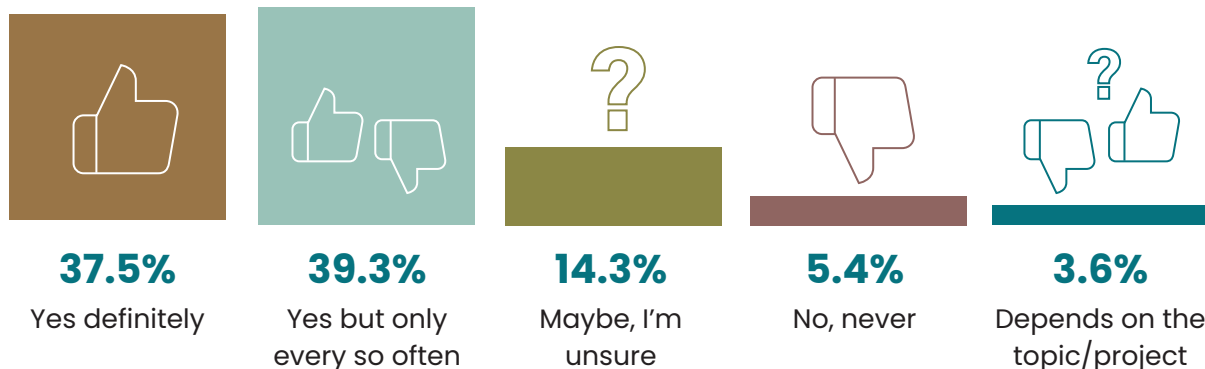

WILLINGNESS TO GET INVOLVED IN CONSULTATION ACTIVITIES



A total of 76.8% of young people indicated a willingness to get involved in consultation activities whereas a total of 17.9% of young people indicated they are unsure or that it would depend on the topic/project.

"I matter, like any other person who lives in Byron. I work in the community, I live in the community, and I learn in the community."



"I grew up here and I care deeply about this place. If Council doesn't listen to the voice of young people, they are neglecting a vital link in the fabric of this community, the new generation of locals. Our deep long-term connection to this place will be the only thing that keeps the community strong as this place changes."



"Young people are the future and have great ideas and views on the world that deserve to be heard."



"I do not believe my views are any more important than the next person, I think that everyone deserves the chance to speak up and be listened to."



"Because I care, and my opinion should be considered and valued despite the fact that I'm a minor."



"As a youth, the Shire will be passed on to us, so we have a right to make changes in it, and this is where I live so I should have as much impact as anyone else."

"A greener, cleaner and kinder community. More multiple occupancies (MO's) and tiny homes, affordable housing, protected beach and nature parts, funding for theatre and youth activism groups."



"More opportunities for young people to stay in the region (not have to leave for study or work)"



"Able to properly accommodate everyone in need of affordable housing and transport so that living in Byron is more affordable and enjoyable."



"Sustainable tourism in the Shire."



"I hope the Byron Shire will be a more inclusive and accessible place for young people, with more opportunities for young people to be involved in the community with the guarantee of their opinions being heard and acknowledged."



"Cleaner, greener and abundant opportunities for everyone."



"I hope for there to be more services for young people in need, e.g., mental health, homelessness, public transportation."



"I hope the Byron Shire has more affordable housing and more action to prevent climate change."



"A more inclusive and interactive community that focuses on the greater good of the wider community and the environment."



"Safer. More facilities. Better roads."



"I hope that we all stay free, to make our own decisions, free from corruption, free from judgement."



"A safe place with no discrimination against anyone, a place where we can celebrate all the different cultures we have here and learn about them too."
