Dear Byron Shire Council,

I am writing to wholeheartedly support the proposal to change this street name.

The term Hottentot is widely considered racially offensive.

While this might not have been the case at the time of the original street naming, this is no justification for it to remain. Language is constantly evolving: many expressions that were previously considered obscene are now in commonplace usage while conversely various formerly everyday terms are now unable to even be printed.

The name Hottentot was originally given to the Khoikhoi peoples of Africa in the mid 17th century and is thought to originate from the Dutch verb 'to stutter'. This was to reflect the 'click consonants' in the Khoi languages, which the Dutch felt resembled a stutter or stammer. The Eurocentric ridiculing of unfamiliar language sounds are now rightly considered outdated and offensive: we no longer refer, for example, to people of Chinese ancestry by derogatory names intended to mimic their language.

That the Khoikhoi people have arguably less political clout than some other racial or cultural groups might have should not be a consideration to disregard the origins and continued implications of this slur. Even if only a comparatively small percentage of the population is made to feel shame and indignity at hearing this name, this should absolutely override the majority of people for whom this name has no or little connotations. The term is also strongly evocative of Sarah Baartman who was kidnapped from Africa and paraded naked around Europe in early 1800s while exhibited in 'freak shows'. Sarah was given the moniker 'The Hottentot Venus' by the European viewers who deemed her non-human and she died at the age of 26 after a lifetime of degradation, humiliations, and frequent sexual assaults.

This is hardly a legacy we wish to uphold and endorse in a welcoming, inclusive environment such as Byron Shire.

After its initial usage, the term Hottentot came to apply to anyone with darker skin from the African continent\* and in doing so, continues to impact upon all those bearing a non-European skin.

While this history may not be well known in Australia now, times and societal norms change very quickly, especially in the era of the internet. Less than two decades ago there was an outrageously offensive name remaining on a stadium in Toowoomba, Queensland which a court declared in 2004 was non-discriminatory and essentially perfectly fine. This is despite the offending word not being able to be even printed or publicly uttered in USA at the time. Three years later the sign was suddenly taken down.

This is the present reality: things that may have been considered 'perfectly fine', 'just a joke' or indeed 'a term of affection'(!) at one time can very quickly be shamed, pilloried or 'cancelled'.

Byron Shire Council now has an opportunity to address this head-on, by virtue of this proposal and it would be heart-warming for us to take this step to be on the right side of history.

I live on it so I reckon I've as much right as any to express my 2c worth!

To call something Hottentot is like naming it the "n word". It's an offensive and derogatory and racist word.

One argument against the name change is to say that there's a tree also called Hottentot? Well - that maybe true. But where do you think the tree got the name!!?

It's the same derivation - it's a name that comes from a time and place rooted in terrible persecution and discrimination.

If we want to name it after a tree we could find out what the Bunjalung name for the tree is and call it that.... Or apparently it's also called a drunk parrot tree. I could go along with that!

"Decolonization" is a bit of long winded way of saying that some historical bits of the world are terrible, and it's ok to acknowledge that do what we can to mitigate some of the impacts of that. Some of the labels and language still in use come from that terrible history, and one of the things we can do is acknowledge that and change our language a bit, because for some people hearing and seeing those words reminds them in horrible ways about that terrible past.

The "disruption" of changing a street name is hardly a big price to pay to end up with a street name that's not rooted in discrimination and persecution.

I've changed my address many many times over my life. It's really not that big a deal. You can use mail forwarding at the post office for a minimal price and each bit of mail you get you just let them know of the street name change. It's a bit of a pain of admin to do, but not hard.

Showing that we can move forward and learn from history and show some respect for all humans? Now, to me, that's something worth spending a little on.
